Fiber Initiative Phase II

City of Centennial

In 2013, Centennial voters approved a ballot question allowing the City the opportunity to partner with private providers to make use of the City's existing fiber optic infrastructure. The ballot question was approved by an overwhelming majority of 76 percent. As a result of the passing of this ballot question, the City is exploring opportunities related to its fiber optic infrastructure. This may increase competition by providing opportunities to a greater number of service providers to partner with the City in using the City's fiber optic infrastructure to deliver services to residents and businesses. Such competition may decrease costs of services to residents and businesses.

Phase I of the Fiber Initiative was completed earlier this year and included an analysis of broadband service in the City, meetings with key stakeholders, and a full inventory of fiber-optic and conduit infrastructure. The Phase 1 report concluded that to move forward with any of the recommended approaches, further development of the City's fiber optic backbone is required before any next steps can be explored.

The City has contracted with Magellan Advisors to initiate Phase II of this Initiative. Magellan will design a fiber optic backbone, develop a preliminary cost proposal and draft initial strategic goals for review by City Council. Magellan has significant experience in the municipal fiber business, having worked with more than 200 cities, including Hamilton, Ohio; Riverside, California; Davenport, Iowa; Baltimore, Maryland; Fort Lauderdale, Florida, among others.

Zoo Curator and Tour Organizer

Bill Turner

I have lived in the Southglenn community since 1990. I moved to Denver from Los Angeles in 1977 to assume the first paid education position at the Denver Zoo after a varied 7 1/2 year career at the Los Angeles Zoo. As a youngster, I maintained a reptile collection and studied reptiles extensively. Many people have a vision of their dream job and mine in high school was to own my own snake farm. In essence, this dream became a reality when I was hired as reptile curator at the new, developing Los Angeles Zoo where I quickly set about expanding the old zoo's token reptile collection to fill the large reptile exhibit in the new facility. Purchases from reptile dealers in the U.S. and exporters from around the world followed - it was like Christmas!

Advancement into administration led me away from my interests and to the Denver Zoo where I worked for 21 1/2 years, most of those as head of the education department. While at the zoo, I started taking docents regularly on wildlife trips to Australia, a country I have a great affection for. After I retired in 1999, I formed my own nature tour company and I've expanded my destinations from Australia to include Belize, Costa Rica and Brazil and occasionally, other countries. My education efforts have shifted from captive animals to animals living in the wild.

It is gratifying to me to use my contacts and knowledge of natural history to provide my tour participants with memorable wildlife experiences. Viewing a tree full of colorful, endangered Gouldian finches at an outback waterhole, a koala with a baby peering down from a eucalyptus tree, a mob of kangaroos hopping off in the twilight in Australia. A mother jaguar with her two cubs on a sandbar in the Cuiaba River in Brazil's Pantanal (yes, this is a place where realistically, there are excellent chances to see this cat as I did in this scenario on last year's tour) and the magnificent gaudy resplendent quetzal, arguably the most attractive bird in the American tropics, in the Costa Rican cloud forest - all of these experiences and more provide lifetime memories.

On all of my tours, throughout the trip, I have excellent local naturalists who are knowledgeable of the fauna, flora, and culture. Groups are small with no more than ten to twelve participants, sometimes fewer. The lodges where we stay are in prime habitats and you start seeing wildlife right outside your door. Some of my tours focus on birds while others have a more general nature orientation, but even on my birding tours, we do not fail to appreciate the other natural wonders we experience.

In 2016, I am offering birding trips to Costa Rica, March 21-April 4, and to Australia, November 1-18. In addition, there will be a January 30-February 8 Belize tour featuring a stay on an idyllic caye on Belize's barrier reef (second largest in the world), a visit to Lamanai Mayan Ruins, sunrise canoe excursions, toucans, howler monkeys, and a horse and buggy tour of a Mennonite community, ending with a delicious lunch at a Mennonite's home.

I have been fortunate to follow my passions vocationally, initially with reptiles and now with nature-based travel. My travels have taken me to Australia over twenty-five times and to Costa Rica more than a dozen times, almost all of these on occasions leading tours, as well as to over twenty-two other countries. 
Beware IRS Scam

The impersonator says I am guilty of tax evasion and that unless I call him back immediately, he will be forced to file with the court to have me arrested. This impersonator has used the names Officer Pete Morgan and Officer Malvin Backer. This is a scam. Do NOT give him any information or money! You can file a report with the IRS Fraud Dept. by using Form 3949A downloaded from the internet atwww.irs.gov/forms.

Nearly 20 people have commented on this post. The general consensus is that the IRS would not place a call to inform you of such information - they would send a letter. People have found that by confronting the caller as a scam, or letting the caller know they are recording the call, that the line goes dead very quickly. Thanks, neighbors on Nextdoor, for looking out for one another.

- Sell the dream. Jobs didn't sell computers, he sold what the computers could do—how they could make people's lives better. Keep this in mind when telling customers why they should do business with you.
- Communicate. Apple's product announcements were legendary for their theatricality and for Jobs' talents as a showman. He stuck to his core message while educating and entertaining the public.

Not Just Beer and Pizza Anymore? Students Healthier Than You Think

The stereotype of college students sitting around the dorm munching chips and watching videos may not be accurate, according to the Student Health Guide study of 5,000 students conducted by the Steroidal website. Take exercise, for example: Among the students surveyed, 47 percent said they exercise about once a day, and 35 percent report exercising a couple of times a week; only 1 percent said they "almost never" exercise.

The news is positive in nutrition as well: Sixty-one percent said they make a conscious effort to eat organic foods, and 37 percent almost always check out nutrition information on the labels on grocery items. In addition, 66 percent reported that they pay attention to their calorie consumption, and 69 percent watch their sugar intake.

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Prepare Your Child For The First Day of School

Getting your children off on the right foot when they start school helps set the tone for their academic success. These suggestions from the American Academy of Pediatrics can help you prepare your kids for their first day of school and a successful school year:

- Calm their fears. Let them know that feeling nervous about the first day of school is normal. Encourage them to talk about their feelings, and listen sympathetically.
- Focus on the positives. Be upbeat about what to expect without building up unrealistic hopes about how great the school year will be. Remind them that they'll make friends and that teachers are there to help them.
- Visit the school. This helps young children become familiar and comfortable with the school. If possible, try to meet with your kids' teachers.
- Enlist a neighborhood child to serve as a buddy. If your neighborhood has children who attend the same school as your child, get them to travel together. On the first few days of school, though, walk with your children to the bus stop or to school.
- Review safety rules. Go over safety measures regarding traffic and strangers.

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The Right Diet May Guard Against Dementia

Could the right diet lower your risk of developing Alzheimer's disease? Maybe, according to an article on the MedicineNet website—although the results aren't conclusive yet. A study of adults who closely followed a combination of two well-known diet plans, the Mediterranean diet and the DASH diet, found that subjects had a 53 percent lower risk of being diagnosed with Alzheimer's. Other subjects who stuck to the diet only moderately well saw their risk drop approximately 35 percent.

The combination diet plan, known as the MIND diet, emphasizes healthy grains, vegetables, beans, poultry, and fish, along with a limited amount of red meat, butter, and sweets. Researchers have noted that other factors, like smoking history, regular exercise, and challenging activities like Sudoku or crossword puzzles, have also contributed to diet followers' results.

On the other hand, both the Mediterranean and DASH diets are believed to effective at preventing heart disease, making them a healthy choice for other reasons.

Care For Your Pet In Hot Weather

The dog days of summer can pose a serious threat to your pet's health. The Humane Society of the United States offers these guidelines to pet owners for keeping their furry friends safe this summer:

- Never leave your pet in the car. During warm weather, the inside of your car can reach 120 degrees in a matter of minutes, even if you're parked in the shade. Pets who are left in hot cars even briefly can suffer from heat exhaustion, heat stroke, and brain damage.
- Keep an eye on the water. Always supervise a pet in a pool. Provide plenty of water and shade for your pets while they're enjoying the great outdoors so they can stay cool.
- Limit exercise. On hot days, take pets out only in early morning or evening hours. Hot asphalt can burn their paws. Pets can get sunburned, too, and your pet may require sunscreen on his or her nose and ear tips.
- Watch for danger signs. The signs of heat stress include heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid pulse, unsteadiness, a staggering gait, vomiting, or a deep red or purple tongue.

If your pet does become overheated, move him or her into the shade and apply cool (not cold) water over his or her body. Let your pet drink small amounts of water or lick ice cubes. If necessary, get him to a veterinarian immediately.



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
