In late June we lost my father in law to a short but terrible battle with cancer. He was still rather young at only 68 and his passing has left a gaping hole in that side of my family. While he is gone, his memory still casts a shadow across my life and my family and I wanted to take a minute or two of your time to tell you some of the lessons he taught me.

- **Leadership is taken, not given.** Dave was born and raised in a valley in the Appalachians, affectionately referred to as a “hollow”. His youth was akin to something out of a Steinbeck novel. He didn’t let the poverty and disadvantage of his youth define him. By the time of his death he had built a successful business and comfortable life for his family and friends. He didn’t wait to get an invite to do that, because in life that invite never comes, he just made it happen.
- **Don’t let your past define your future.** We all know people that have let their past cripple their future. Bad things happen. Dave pushed past all that

baggage and made a great life. Dave wasn’t as nerdy as me, but I think he was a stoic at heart. This quote from Seneca reminds me of him: “Many people are afraid to live as they wish and instead live simply as they have begun.” Don’t be afraid to live life.

- **No one remembers the score, only the great plays.** Dave was a pretty good golf player and one of the few guys who was good that you could play with and wouldn’t try to coach you to death. When we would go out he wouldn’t even keep score. You played 18 to remember the birdies and chip ins. Life is the same way. You remember key moments. Memories like that don’t flash before your eyes but go on forever like the ocean the first time you see it.

DID WE DRINK MORE DURING COVID-19?

Locked down in 2020 because of the spreading coronavirus outbreak, many people baked bread, studied foreign languages, and stopped wearing pants. But did they drink more? It might have been tempting, but a study conducted on behalf of the Beer Institute (reported on the Craft Brewing Business website), found that most people didn't increase their consumption of beer and other alcoholic beverages, despite the assumption that drinking must have increased during the lockdown.

Echelon Insights conducted a nationally representative survey of registered voters age 21+ during March 1-4, 2021. One in five respondents indicated they did drink more beer, wine, and liquor last year, but the same number also reported drinking less, and 60% said their drinking habits hadn't changed at all since the beginning of the pandemic.

COVID-19 did have an impact on the beer industry, though. The pandemic resulted in a loss of almost \$20 billion in retail beer sales, and more than 561,000 U.S. jobs were lost, the majority in bars and restaurants that suffered from restrictions or closed outright.

AUGUST: WHAT'S IN A NAME?

August is named for the Roman emperor Augustus Caesar, grandnephew of Julius Caesar. When Augustus defeated Cleopatra and Mark Antony at the Battle of Actium in 30 B.C., he became emperor of Rome, and the Roman Senate quickly decided that since the month of July was named for Julius, their new emperor should also have his own month.

At the time, Sextillius (the sixth month of the year in the pre-Gregorian calendar) had only 30 days, so the Senate also decreed that the newly named August should be equal to July, and took a day from February to keep the calendar in balance.

Other emperors tried to get months named for them: May was called Claudius for a while, and April became Neronius, but the names didn't stick. Only Julius and Augustus Caesar's names apparently had the staying power to last 2,000 years.

WHAT DOES THAT MEAN? ORIGINS OF COMMON TERMS

The origins of some figures of speech are obvious—putting the cart before the horse, for instance. Others are a little more obscure. From Jeff Rovin's book *The Unbelievable Truth!* (Signet) here's a look at the explanations behind three common expressions:

- **Pulling the wool over their eyes.** In the 17th and 18th centuries, thieves and robbers would yank their victims' wool wigs down over their eyes so they couldn't see who was attacking them.
- **Blackmail.** In 16th-century England, mail meant "rent" or "tribute." Debts that had to be paid in silver were called "whitemail." A debt that could be paid in any other way—from livestock to property—was called "blackmail." Because blackmail did not have a set value, the person collecting the debt could extort any amount or anything they wished from the debtor.
- **Red tape.** For centuries, it was British custom to seal important documents with red wax and red tape. Cutting through it was the only way to get at the documents and read them.

ONE LAST BARBECUE? KEEP IT SAFE

The end of summer frequently means one last barbecue—your final chance to enjoy warm weather before school starts for kids and work ramps up again for everyone else. You don't want to spoil the fun with an accident at the grill, though. Keep these important safety tips in mind for a good time:

- **Read the instructions.** Whether you're using a gas grill or one that burns charcoal, take some time to read the owner's manual before starting your fire. Be sure you're following the manufacturer's safety guidelines.
- **Always grill outdoors.** This may seem elementary, but not everyone understands the need for proper ventilation and basic fire precautions. Your garage, or a tent, isn't a safe location for a grill.
- **Keep the grill stable.** Check the surface you're placing your grill on. You don't want it to tip over unexpectedly. Also, take care to place it well away from the flow of people and pets, and especially children.
- **Clean the grill first.** Scrape off any grease or fat that can make a fire difficult to control.
- **Stay close by.** Never leave your grill alone while you're talking, getting food, or enjoying yourself.
- **Dispose of coals safely.** Once you're finished, douse the hot coals thoroughly, cover the grill, and wait at least 24 hours before emptying it. Never store coals in paper, wood, or plastic containers.

TREAT SUNBURN QUICKLY

If you've been enjoying the great outdoors after a year of lockdown, chances are good you've been exposed to the sun, and that can cause sunburn if you're not careful. The Patience website shares these guidelines for treating sunburn effectively:

- **Get out of the sun.** If your skin starts to feel hot or sore, get into the shade as quickly as possible to avoid further damage.
- **Cool affected skin.** Use a cool, damp washcloth, or take a bath or shower. This may feel uncomfortable, but it will help minimize the damage.
- **Hydrate.** Drink lots of water. Sunburn is often associated with heatstroke and fatigue, so getting more fluids into your body helps heal you from the inside out.
- **Take painkillers.** Try over-the-counter pain relief and anti-inflammatory medications like ibuprofen or paracetamol to relieve soreness.
