Do you know what is happening at Southglenn shopping mall?

Just in case you haven't been reading your newsletter or going to the meetings, our Southglenn mall is likely going to turn into more apartments at Southglenn. That's on top of the 202 that are already there. Where will they build all of these,



you ask? The old Sears building and the adjacent parking lots. The preliminary plans look like it will consume all of that area backing up to the sidewalk on Easter. After the Sears property redevelopment, Macy's will undergo a similar redevelopment of the store space and parking lot directly east of the store. The Macy's-area redevelopment could eventually include more apartments up to 6 stories high with underground parking along with a little retail and office space in the near future. for the Streets at Southglenn was held on March 19. (Future meetings will be announced but too late to include in this issue.) The meetings are required by the city and intended to give us an opportunity to engage in dialogue with the development team and learn about what they are proposing and learn about the review process. Unfortunately, our hosts were not prepared for the 200 people who showed up at the old Sears building. We were too many, more than their format could handle. Ten to 20 people surrounded each of the speakers, straining to hear... "The number of residential apartment rental units will be ... "What did he say? Was that 400 or 800 or 1,600? The renderings of the new buildings looked like four and five stories. But wait, did he just say eight stories? Just how many people are we expecting to cram in? What's this going to do to traffic? Just what are the zoning laws as they stand now, and what are the developers asking to be changed? We showed up ready to engage but it was quite impossible to work out the jumble of information through the chaos.

Everyone I spoke to afterward said they left with as many questions as they had when they walked in. Many said they were fearful that the Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council might be too hasty to approve the changes to the Streets at Southglenn Master Development Plan which would allow greater heights and densities

(and traffic?) without allowing us adequate opportunity to absorb, understand and communicate the size and



impact increased density will have on our nearby communities. Hopefully, the next meeting will be more organized.

Notices by the City regarding upcoming meetings are being sent to all HOA's and Civic Associations registered with the City that is located within 1 mile, adjacent property owners within 200 feet of the Streets at Southglenn, and to CenCon (Centennial Council of Neighborhoods). The job of getting the word out has been placed essentially on the shoulders of the volunteer association leaders.

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SOUTH METRO DENVER AREA BRACES FOR POTENTIAL FLIGHT-PATH CHANGES

The Federal Aviation Administration's NextGen project — an effort to increase safety and efficiency of air transportation across the country — began in 2007 and is expected to be largely in place by 2025. In the Denver area, the potential overhaul lies in the NextGen Denver Metroplex project, which aims to optimize arrival and departure at local airports, including Denver International Airport, Centennial Airport, and some others. The rub in the south suburbs is a possible moving of flight paths that generally stay east of Interstate 25 and south of DIA to a new corridor that could run above the areas of Littleton, Englewood, and Cherry Hills Village, for example.

Centennial Airport officials said the proposal would change one route's approach into the airport "dramatically." "The BRNKO route generates multiple concerns," said Robert Olislagers, executive director of Centennial Airport, using the path's technical name. "First, if implemented, it puts aircraft over communities that have previously not seen much or any air traffic."

Disruptions to daily life and disturbances to the environment are among the consequences south metro-area mayors fear could land on their cities if a federal plan to reroute airplane traffic is implemented as it has appeared so far.

The FAA plans to present an environmental assessment this spring and hold public workshops in May, with a 30-day additional comment period after the last event. It's anticipated the FAA will present a final environmental assessment in September and begin implementation around March 2020. The first Public Workshop is scheduled for May 2, 4 pm at the Aurora Municipal Center located at 15151 E Alameda Parkway. Phoenix, Washington DC and other metro areas have pursued litigation with the FAA over Metroplex implementation in their area. It is imperative that people attend these public workshops.

While Metroplex is an initiative of the FAA, Centennial Airport also has Community Noise Roundtables, monthly public meetings held the first Wednesday of each month. The next is scheduled for Wednesday, April 3 at 6:30 p.m. at Arapahoe County Lima Plaza (Arapahoe Room) - 6954 S Lima St., Centennial CO 80112.


